

DRINK SPIKING

Drink Spiking or Drug and Alcohol Facilitated Sexual Assault describes a situation where a person's ability to consent to or refuse sexual activity is impaired as a result of consuming too much alcohol and/or other drugs, either by the victim's own choice or because of drink spiking. Women and particularly young women are more commonly targeted.

Drugs and/or alcohol used to spike drinks can have unexpected effects. Persons displaying behaviour that is 'out of character' or inconsistent with the amount of alcohol or non-alcoholic drink consumed should be taken to hospital for medical attention.

Sometimes drugs used to spike drinks are colourless and tasteless so that patrons might not realise that anything has been added. However, alcohol is the single most commonly used drug to spike other people's drinks, with up to 75% of victims testing positive to high levels of alcohol. There is no 'typical' incident of drink spiking.

Licensees should be mindful of the potential for drink spiking occurring at their venue and not encourage the pouring of double and triple shots. In addition they should encourage patrons to:

- ✓ Always get their own drink and watch it being poured;
- ✓ Not leave their drink unattended;
- ✓ Not accept drinks from others;
- ✓ Never assume a friend is merely drunk – ensure they get home safely

Licensees have a legal duty of care of all patrons. Licensees should be vigilant, and treat all complaints of spiking seriously. Ensure staff are aware that drink spiking (including adding of additional alcohol to standard drinks) can occur and ask them to be alert at all times.

DRUG & ALCOHOL FACILITATED SEXUAL ASSAULT

A guide for staff working in the hospitality industry

Drug and Alcohol Facilitated Sexual Assault describes a situation where a person's ability to consent to or refuse sexual activity is impaired as a result of consuming too much alcohol and/or other drugs, either by victim's own choice or because of drink spiking.

If you witness or receive a report from a patron that she/he has been sexually assaulted and/or her/his drink has been spiked, the best practice would be for staff to exercise the following procedure:

1. Take the victim to a safe place.
2. Secure evidence eg glass or drink bottle.
3. Report the incident to the Duty Manager.
4. Record basic information about the victim, her/his companions if any, and if possible, also gather information about the suspected perpetrator.
5. Enter incident into the log book.
6. Ask the victim if they would like to speak to the Police or Sexual Assault Referral Centre (SARC) and offer to make the contact.
7. If the victim does not want the Police or SARC, provide them with these phone numbers and ensure they are able to travel to a safe place
